This course is the first course in the program plan that introduces the students to the field of linguistics as a 'scientific' study of language. As an introductory course, the students are introduced to the five basic components of the study of language: phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics. The course introduces the students to the basic linguistic concepts in the study of language in terms of its sound system, word structure, sentence structure, and meaning. By the end of the course, the students should be prepared to proceed to Introduction to Linguistics II and the linguistic core courses (phonetics,

phonology, syntax, morphology, and semantics).
