4. Course general Description:

This course is designed to provide students with the foundational concepts and skills needed to read and critically respond to literature. It begins by engaging students with important questions about the definition and practice of literary studies, such as: What is literature and what is the field of literary studies? Why do we study literature and what is the task of a literary scholar? What do we mean by “genre” and “canon” and how fixed are their boundaries? The rest of the course is organized into three parts which will continue to pursue these questions in relation to the three major formal genres: fiction, poetry, and drama. The focus in each part will be on highlighting the formal and structural elements that define that genre and how they contribute to the meaning and purpose of a literary work. This will be done through a close reading of a range of texts that will also help introduce students to the literary devices and techniques used by writers across genres, including figures of speech, imagery, diction, tone, and structure. Although the course chiefly focuses on honing student’s skills in the formal analysis of literature, they will be occasionally encouraged to consider how the biographical and historical context may aid in the interpretation of an author’s work.
