This history effects and the series of the s	4. Course general Description: This course explores the development of modern European drama. It begins by explaining the social, historical, philosophical and cultural contexts of the modern age, including the concept of modernism that effected the ways dramatists approached writing plays. The course discusses highlights of this turbulent period of theatrical experimentation as playwrights sought new ways to represent the tensions inherent in modern life. It will also briefly go over the period's different theatrical forms and movements such as naturalism, realism, social realism, Avant Garde theatre, absurdist drama, symbolism, surrealism and expressionism. References will be made to the original theatrical conventions and to those of contemporary productions. The first six weeks will be dedicated to tackling a number of topics in relation to at least five dramatic texts which can be organized chronologically or thematically. The remaining part of the course will focus on analyzing in detail a representative play of the instructor's choice that exemplifies the features of European drama, and the movement or theory it conveys. Essential to this course is the screening of contemporary theatrical productions so that students are exposed to the performative aspects of modern European theatre alongside the textual. References will be made to the original theatrical conventions and to those of contemporary productions. Note: Students will focus only on one of the key texts suggested in the list of topics. Other texts may be mentioned, but they will not be discussed in detail.
