- Through their presentations projects, students are encouraged to act certain scenes from the

plays being studied. Some are encouraged to produce their own theatrical version of the play(s) being studied.

• To demonstrate knowledge of modern literature from four conventional perspectives: the study of an author, a movement, a genre, a decade and to reconsider these from the perspective of cutting-edge literary and cultural theory.
