The course introduces students to the topic of how languages are studied, with English as a major example. It is the first course in linguistics that the students take. It, therefore, presents

them with a general linguistic description of language. The areas of linguistic inquiry taught in this course are phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics. It also introduces students to the study of language change and historical linguistics. While the course prepares students for the upper level courses in linguistics, it is by no means an extensive study of each of these areas of linguistics.
