B. Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

1. Course Description

This course reviews, strengthens and deepens students understanding of the main grammatical structures. It consolidates the rules introduced previously in Structure 1 and Structure 2. It focuses on how to use and practice English tenses effectively. It concentrates on the form and use of different types of clauses and passive constructions and the way sentences are joined using different conjunctions. It also gives students practice in the use of gerunds and infinitives. In addition, it focuses on the use of the different types of conditional sentences.

2. Course Main Objective

The course aims to deepen students' knowledge of some high-intermediate grammatical components of English language, particularly with reference to the analysis of complex sentences developing students' ability to use these grammatical elements in the construction of varied complex sentences in cohesive and coherent texts through consolidating the major grammar units covered in Structure 1 and Structure 2.
